

#### RATE INCREASE

#### - HELP PUT SR IN LIBRARIES -

Socialist Review is addressing many of the most important issues facing the left. We are publishing articles that are accessible to a wide audience, on major contemporary social and political developments, from a socialist perspective. We would like to ask you, our readers, to help broaden the range of people who see SR, and thereby help to increase the impact of its ideas.

You can do this by encouraging your library, whether campus, public, community, or trade union, to subscribe. At present we have over 300 library subscriptions—but we ought to have several times that. Given the tight budgets of the great majority of libraries at present, the main way that our library subscriptions could be expanded is through direct requests by library users.

It's very important to us, financially as well as politically, to be broadly available in libraries. Library subscriptions provide a relatively stable source of income; *SR's* presence in libraries is one of the main ways that new subscribers will find out about the journal.


There are several things you can do to increase our presence in libraries and other institutions:

- Ask your library to subscribe to SR. If they are reluctant, tell them
  that we will send information to them about the journal, as well as
  sample copies. If you are a student at an institution where generally
  only faculty library requests are met, ask a sympathetic faculty member to submit the request in your behalf.
- If you are at a large institution which has a number of libraries, but only one subscription to *SR*, request that other libraries at the institution subscribe.
- Encourage friends at other institutions to ask their libraries to subscribe.

It only takes a few minutes to make these requests, and they are the main way that SR can hope to become a part of a growing number of libraries. Increasing SR's library subscriptions helps the journal financially—and makes a political contribution by helping to expand, if only modestly, the public availability of socialist analyses and ideas. We hope that you'll take the time to make this effort.



#### INTRODUCTION

THE DECLINE OF COLD-WAR LIBERALISM and the efforts of the I right to build a movement against welfare-state policies and the cultural and social movements of the 1960s and 1970s have been evident for several years. In the last year, the concrete forms of these strategies have become much clearer. The "trilateralism" that was to permit Carter to rebuild the New Deal liberal coalition along corporatist lines has not proved to be much of a success. It has not managed to overcome the problems that led to the fragmentation of the traditional Democratic bloc, and the position of the Carter administration remains tenuous.

"Proposition 13" has become a symbol of crucial parts of the political and cultural mood. For a period after its passage in California, its proponents ambitiously imagined that they might be able to duplicate their success readily throughout the country. These expectations were overly optimistic. And with the defeat of the anti-homosexual initiative in California (Proposition 6) the cultural and social aspects of the right's efforts have also reached a barrier. In assessing the current situation, it would be wrong to stress the immediate successes of the right. The results of the 1978 elections were ambiguous. In some cases, far-right candidates defeated long-
